

**Xavier's Resource Centre for the Visually Challenged (XRCVC)**



**The XRCVC's Annual Report for 2018-19 (June to May)**

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The quality of life of most disabled persons can be bettered simply by providing them equal opportunities and effective access to rehabilitation measures. Ironically, though, a person with disability often lives the life of a second-class citizen.

And this is where the Xavier's Resource Centre for the Visually Challenged (XRCVC) tries to make a difference.

The XRCVC was initially set up as a resource and advocacy centre for persons with visual impairment. However, as an enabling unit on campus at St Xavier's College (Autonomous), Mumbai, it has now expanded its offering to include services to students with hearing / speech impairment, autism, learning disabilities, and those with orthopaedic disabilities as well.

XRCVC endeavours to transform lives for persons with disability both at the micro and macro levels. Along with providing direct and indirect support at the micro level, it works closely with government agencies, corporates, researchers and educational institutions at the macro level on advocacy and sensitisation initiatives — particularly in the areas of education access, financial access, print access, and independent living.

XRCVC disseminates information about its work to members and other stakeholders on an almost real-time basis through its website ([www.xrcvc.org](http://www.xrcvc.org)) and on social media through its Facebook page (XRCVC—Xavier's Resource Centre for the Visually Challenged) and Twitter handle (@XRCVC).

In the academic year 2018-19, St Xavier's College (Autonomous) had 110 students with disability on its rolls. The Enabling Committee of the college — a staff-cum-student representative committee that looks into all inclusion and accessibility needs on campus —



ensured that each of these students had an enriching curricular and extra-curricular experience. The Coordinator, Students with Disability, who coordinates the working of this committee, works out of XRCVC and is the main resource person to process all student requests and needs.

Along the way, there was recognition as well. For its efforts to promote inclusion and its commitment to inclusive education, St Xavier's College was awarded The Nipman Foundation Microsoft Equal Opportunity Awards 2018 in the Enabler category (Inclusive Schools — Higher Education). This is a recognition for the hard work that the college has put in to make the campus inclusive in every sense of the word. The winners for the Nipman awards were announced after a rigorous selection by an independent jury chaired by Ms. Stuti Kacker, Founder and Former Secretary, Department of Disability Affairs, Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt. of India. Ms Neha Trivedi from XRCVC collected the award on behalf of the college at a function organised in New Delhi on November 16.

In March 2019, the XRCVC was also honoured to host Reverend Fr. General Arturo Sosa, S.J. — Superior General of the Society of Jesus — during his visit to St Xavier's College (Autonomous).

In addition to meeting requirements of students on campus, the XRCVC is also actively involved in promoting inclusion and access across the country through its range of training, advocacy and awareness programmes.

## Membership base

In 2018-19, XRCVC's membership base expanded to 678 persons. But the centre does not restrict its offerings solely to its members. Its advocacy work allows it to touch — and hopefully transform — thousands of lives across the country.

The XRCVC offers a range of direct support and training services to persons with disabilities, caregivers, educators, and institutions.



Direct support provided included scanning, demonstration of and training in the usage of assistive devices, career advice, basic computer training, software assistance, mobile phone usage training, smartcane usage training, Braille printing, follow-up with publishers for accessible copies of books, coordinating with educational institutions, banks and other financial bodies, etc.

### **Volunteer support**

Despite all the technology and advancements, human assistance cannot be eliminated completely for persons with disability. The XRCVC provides volunteer services for:

- Reading
- Converting material into accessible formats for people with visual impairment – through typing, scanning, editing, recording
- Teaching — for any subject
- Examination taking — scribe facilities (this service is provided in collaboration with the Student Inclusion Cell of St Xavier's College)
- Any other requirement on a need basis

Depending on the member's needs and requirements, the XRCVC provides volunteers both for short- and long-term needs.

Ninety volunteers and five interns worked with the centre during the year, sourced mainly from the Social Involvement Programme (SIP) and ECC programme of St Xavier's College (Autonomous).

### **Assistive technologies**

The XRCVC houses an exhaustive list of assistive technologies (AT) that can be explored by visually challenged persons — as also employers, government bodies, and any other group that would like to know more about AT. Anyone is welcome to drop in at the XRCVC, with prior appointment, to explore the full range of assistive technologies and their use.

The centre procured a wide range of new technologies in 2018-19. Some of these include Google Home Mini, MI TV, Vernier - Talking Labquest 2 (LQ2 - TLKPKG-EN) with braille keyboard, I-Phone SE 32 GB, Braille Me devices, Moto G6 - 4GS- 64 GB, Google Chrome Cast 3, MI A2 mobile phone, Logitech - Wireless keyboard, Squirrel rulers, Indo NVDA Software with 17 regional languages, plus software upgradations including Corel draw.



XRCVC is happy to share that the E-waste generated every year is handed over to an organization that is committed to creating a greener future by recycling and disposing end-of-life electronic products in an environmentally sustainable manner.

### **Focused work areas**

During the year, the centre's activities were channelised through three main focus areas:

- a. Education & Learning (KG to PG)
- b. Accessibility Solutions and Inclusive Services
- c. Awareness

Given below is a summary of the centre's activities in 2018-19 under each head.

### **A. Education & Learning (KG to PG)**

While Right to Education has become a fundamental right in India, this right is far from being actualised for persons with disabilities. During the year, the XRCVC continued its work towards inclusive education practices and services at school, college and higher education levels. A plethora of activities were conducted during the year in this connection, some of which are described below.

- XRCVC provided all the resources and manpower to St Xavier's College that was required to ensure the smooth conduct of the Enabling Committee's activities during the year.
- Ongoing work continued with students who are part of the XRCVC's comprehensive educational offering. During the year, the centre also regularly conducted training and sensitisation sessions at Prime Academy, and other institutions.





- Work pertaining to book content creation and accessible study material creation continued through the year. Both staff and volunteers are engaged in this work.
- Ongoing work on Geometry Tools Research for students with visual impairment continued during the year.
- In July 2019, Dr Sam Taraporevala was a speaker and panelist at the 6th Annual Drishti Symposium being organised on the theme, 'Leading Mixed Ability Classrooms' at ADAPT, Mumbai.
- In September, Dr Taraporevala was a speaker and panelist at the National Conference on Social Integration, 'Know your Rights' organized in Keshav Vidyapeeth, Jaipur.
- The centre also collaborated with NCERT in its efforts to make science kits for the blind at the upper primary school level.

- The centre continued to collaborate with Inclusive Stem (I-Stem), comprising a group of young persons who are blind or visually impaired from India pursuing science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) education and careers. The group organized its second hackathon in Bangalore in January 2019. The aim was to bust myths about blind programmers and start the process of making the tech industry in India accessible. The hackathon brought blind and visually impaired developers, industry professionals and sighted computer science students together to work on exciting and challenging projects for 24 hours. Not only did participants learn technical skills from the hackathon, but also developed a better understanding of each other's strengths and weaknesses.
- In May 2019, XRCVC was invited by Vision Empower to train its staff and volunteers to create accessible Science and Maths content for the visually impaired. Vision Empower is incubated in IIIT Bangalore.
- During the year, a team from XRCVC also visited IIT Madras to provide inputs on the assistive technology laboratory they are working on.
- The centre also held a meeting with Desai Foundation for Change to discuss the working of the resource centre at Swami Vivekanand College.



- During the year, XRCVC worked with Drishti on potential collaborations in the area of inclusion in classrooms.
- The centre also held discussions with the Maharashtra Dyslexia Association and Unique Ability Consulting on spreading awareness among educational institutions about the needs of students with disability.
- The XRCVC, through the year, continued its ongoing pioneering work in the area of mathematics and science education. Students were provided direct support services. The centre created accessible electronic textbooks, Teaching-Learning Aids (TLAs), and provided conceptual training to these students. In addition, it continued to build on its Teaching-Learning-Aids (TLA) resource library for mathematics and science education, starting Std 1 onwards.

- Ongoing work continued on the production of Concept Teaching Manuals (CTMs), which have been designed for use by teachers working with blind or low vision students. Special educators or parents working on a one-on-one basis, as well as classroom teachers and tuition teachers in an inclusive classroom can incorporate the information and ideas from these manuals. These CTMs cover interactive ways to teach concepts to blind or low vision students including the use of Teaching-Learning Aids (TLAs) in the form of activities, real objects, 3D educational toys and models, 2D tactile diagrams, etc.
- I for Inclusion training sessions were conducted by XRCVC during the year for numerous stakeholders.
- XRCVC continued to give critical inputs to the Bangalore-based company Tactopus, which creates tactile graphics, and also has an interactive audio companion through a smartphone app, that makes it possible for blind children to learn independently.
- XRCVC worked closely with IIT Kanpur to make their laboratories more accessible, and helped Ashoka University (Sonipat) and St. Andrews College (Mumbai) to build their resource services.
- The centre shared tactile diagram guidelines with the National Atlas and Thematic Mapping Organization (NATMO) and also held a meeting with NATMO's director.



- The centre also worked with ATMA, Next Genius LD Workshop Consultants, Curry College, and Foreman School on inclusion-related activities.
- The centre initiated a conversation with Thinker Bell Labs for a possible partnership. Thinkerbells Labs works in the area of inclusive education and is driven by intuitive engineering and design.

## Personal and Career Guidance

Guidance was also provided to members and their families across disabilities to identify needs, interests and aptitudes as also troubleshoot and cope with concerns.

## Scholarships

Recognising the high costs for higher education and assistive technologies, the XRCVC provides scholarship and access technology lending schemes to deserving students. New higher education avenues have been pursued by students with disability over the last decade. Along with new opportunities come new costs of higher education courses. Similarly, while assistive technologies and computers have provided immense aid to disabled students, what is often considered a luxury for those without disabilities is a necessity for the disabled. In June 2019, during the third anniversary of XRCVC-Viviana Extension in Thane, laptops and smartcanes were distributed to deserving candidates as part of the centre's IT lending scheme.

The Lions Club of East Bombay Scholarship for the year was awarded to Gouri Bhuyan for being the most deserving visually impaired student graduating from St Xavier's College, Mumbai.

## Training

The XRCVC imparts training in Computers, the use of specific assistive devices, Braille, Orientation & Mobility, Maths & Science, English language, and Life skills through various training programmes. These are available for diverse learner groups — disabled persons, special educators, teacher trainers, and other stakeholders.





Training sessions during 2018-19 included customised workshops by various members of the XRCVC team including Calveena D'Sylva, Rebecca Carvalho, Vikas Dabholkar, Neha Trivedi, Sushil Pandit, Shizanne D'Mello, Keshavan Nadar, Krishna Warriar, and Elisha Lopez.

These training sessions were held at XRCVC and XRCVC-Viviana Extension as well as at other locations across the country.

Through the year, the XRCVC's training services reached out to 1496 persons (see Table 1).

## B. Accessibility Solutions and Inclusion Services

Alongside Education Access, XRCVC's advocacy initiatives work in three main areas to create accessible environments: Print Access, Financial Access, and Independent Living.

### Print Access

The access to printed works for the visually challenged depends on its availability in accessible formats and the permissibility of the legal systems to convert material to accessible formats. The XRCVC has been working relentlessly to overcome these challenges.

During this period, the XRCVC produced 50 accessible books (totaling 5400 pages) in addition to 1692 Word pages of class notes. All accessible DAISY titles are uploaded onto a national accessible online library ([sugamyapustakalaya.in](http://sugamyapustakalaya.in)).

Some of the activities conducted under the Print Access initiative during the year are appended below.

- XRCVC continued to work closely with Benetech, a global non-profit social entrepreneurial venture harnessing the power of technology for social benefit on many print access-related initiatives, and also followed up with vendors who could create accessible books. In August 2018, Brad Turner, VP and GM, Global Education and Literacy, Benetech visited the centre to discuss common initiatives.
- Accessible Book Production Standards 1.3 training sessions were conducted regularly during the year by XRCVC for numerous stakeholders.
- Through the year, XRCVC provided support and feedback to many organisations which were conducting research on Refreshable Braille Display devices. These included Innovision, a startup from IIT Bombay which successfully launched its Refreshable Braille Display device named BrailleMe, IIT Delhi's Assistech, Orbit



Research, Dot Incorporation - Korea, and a group of students from Don Bosco Institute of Technology.

- During the year, Dr Taraporevala, Director, XRCVC, attended the Daisy Forum of India (DFI) board meeting and regularly participated in con-calls for various committees of the DFI, including the publisher committee, higher education committee, and periodicals committee.

### Reading Without Seeing

The XRCVC had launched an extremely effective national-level awareness programme in 2012 under the banner of 'Reading Without Seeing', which takes access technologies to blind and low-vision users across locations, and ignites in its audiences the curiosity and basic knowledge to begin their journey of accessing the printed word independently. The programme equips participants with the basic knowhow of a host of assistive technologies.

The programme gained added momentum this year with 15 workshops reaching out to 402 persons (see Table 2) in locations as diverse as Chiplun, Satara, Pune, Kolhapur, Dhule, Thane and Mumbai. These workshops were conducted by the XRCVC team comprising Sushil Pandit, Keshavan Nadar, Aniket Gupta, and Vikas Dabholkar.

## Financial Access

The ability to independently manage, operate and execute one's financial transactions is key to independent living. Lack of effective guidelines and lack of optimum use of technology in financial instruments has traditionally denied financial access to blind and low vision persons. The XRCVC has been striving to change this reality.

- During the year, XRCVC worked with Paytm, Reliance Jio, State Bank of India, Bank of Baroda, etc. to make their Apps accessible.
- The centre also collaborated with SEBI to organise a workshop on investing for persons with disability in November 2018.

- During the year, XRCVC collaborated closely with the State Bank of India's Centre of Excellence (CoE), providing inputs for its various projects and programmes. The Centre of Excellence for PwDs is one of the SBI Foundation's flagship programmes. It was conceptualised with a goal to be a centralised support centre for persons with disabilities. It primarily works on empowering PwDs through skill enhancement to make significant and measurable improvement that enables individuals to enjoy a more productive and satisfying life by optimising their cognitive, physical, social and vocational functioning.
- In October 2018, Sai Bhagat and Prashant Naik presented a poster on talkingATMIndia.org on behalf of XRCVC at the Empower 2018 conference in Sonapat, Haryana.

## Independent Living

Each of us, as we pass through our day, interact with a range of products, environments and services from transport services, to kitchen appliances, and entertainment products. How accessible are these daily living services and products for the visually challenged? The XRCVC's Independent Living initiative questions and works towards rectifying shortcomings in these areas. Some of the activities covered under this initiative during the year are appended below:

- Collaborated with accessibility expert Parul Kumtha to conduct an Accessibility Audit of St Xavier's College (Autonomous).
- Collaborated with XL Cinema Apps and Viviana Cinopolis, Thane to organize an audio-described screening of the film 'Sanju' in July 2018.

- Collaborated with Hinduja Hospital to organize two workshops for visually impaired persons on 'How to administer Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR)' during medical emergencies.
- Worked with CSMVS Museum, Mumbai on accessibility initiatives.
- Worked with Adventures Beyond Barriers (Pune) and DOW Chemicals Mumbai on the on-boarding of a few visually impaired employees in DOW.
- Followed up with officials from the BEST on Onboard, a bus identification system for the visually impaired.
- Provided inputs to Tech Mahindra on creating a Job Training Strategy for Visually impaired persons.
- Provided inputs to Orcam – an Israeli company working on assistive technology for visually impaired persons which has developed a device named MyEye.
- Provided inputs to the Navi Mumbai Municipal Corporation on how to set up a resource centre.
- Collaborated with Social Alpha, an organisation that is building a programme and a platform for assistive technology-based solutions that empower people with disabilities.
- Provided inputs to students from Xavier's Institute of Engineering for their Accessibility Projects.
- Collaborated with Saksham, Enable India and Bookshare for the See A Million programme, a unique time-bound outcome-based mission focusing on digital empowerment of one million persons with vision impairment by 2025.
- During the year, XRCVC continued ongoing research and development work on visual / auditory / tactile teaching-learning aids and other independent living aids. Worked on integrating diverse technologies which could create a composite system to read through fingers, see through eyes, or hear through ears. The research also has immense potential for the teaching-learning process as it can promote paired reading and can assist a non-Braille literate person to function effectively.

### C. Awareness

Creating awareness about the lives and capabilities of visually impaired persons and those with other disabilities is one of the key areas that will open doors for them in a world where the rules are made for and by persons without disabilities.

The XRCVC has been working on a number of such initiatives through its mega awareness and sensitisation event Antarchakshu® — The Eye Within.

This year, Antarchakshu® took on a new avatar — Antarchakshu® 2.0.

The aim of Antarchakshu® 2.0 was to combine the power of bespoke workshops in a marathon run reaching out to larger numbers at the location of participants.

Under this initiative over around 35 need-based sensitization and awareness workshops were conducted during the months of February-March 2019, reaching out to 1190 diverse stakeholders such as college students, corporates, professionals and the public at large.

This approach ensured that the session reached the participant, reducing the need for participants to commute, thus making available flexible and customized workshops for target audiences, all leading to a basic premise of how every individual can contribute towards #CreatingAnAccessibleWorld.

During the year, a total of 93 awareness events (including Antarchakshu®) were conducted at many places and for a variety of target groups, covering 3552 beneficiaries (see Table 3 at the end of this report).



Some of the other awareness initiatives conducted by XRCVC during the year are appended below:

- Dr Taraporevala addressed over 225 participants at a seminar on the theme 'Explore, Experience and Empower' at Dhirubhai Ambani International School, Mumbai in September 2018.
- He was Keynote Speaker at Sameeksha 2019 — a student festival at the Tata Institute of Social Sciences, Mumbai in February 2019.
- He was also invited as chief guest for the annual day function of Snehankit, a non-government organization working towards empowering visually impaired youth.
- During the year XRCVC developed and conducted a unique course called 'Diversity Discourse' at the Xavier's Institute of Communication (XIC). The objective was to sensitise participants to the many communities that society implicitly and explicitly ignores, and make a case for why it is necessary to bring these communities into mainstream public discourse. The content was imparted mainly through interactive workshops to over 250 students at XIC.
- In July 2018, XRCVC was invited by IIT Gandhinagar (IITGn) to conduct 7 sensitisation workshops as part of the 'Foundation Program' for freshman students. Around 190 students benefitted from the same. A team from XRCVC also held discussions with Prof Jason, Dean of Students Affairs, about inclusion practices at IIT Gandhinagar.
- Likewise, in October 2018, XRCVC conducted 7 awareness workshops at St Stephen's College, Delhi organized by 'Parivartan', a student body.
- XRCVC conducted a lecture on accessibility in August 2018 at St Xavier's College for 60 students pursuing the BScIT course.
- The Student Inclusion Cell of St Xavier's College organized a screening of the film 'Wonder' to spread the message of inclusion.
- An awareness workshop on Assistive Technology was conducted at Standard Chartered Bank, Mumbai in October 2018.
- Two sensitisation and awareness workshops were conducted in October 2018 during the Empower 2018 Conference in IIT Delhi's Sonipat campus.
- Sensitisation workshops were also conducted for Lilavatibai Podar High School, Reliance Jio, Snehankit, Jesuit Scholastics, Wilson College, Sophia College, IITB-Monash Research Academy, Thakur College, Viviana Mall.
- On January 4, on the occasion of World Braille Day, an access technology exhibition was organized by XRCVC at Viviana Mall.
- A workshop on STEM education was organized in March 2019 at St Xavier's College for members of the Blind Graduates Forum of India (BGFI)
